- Agree on the components of an operating culture for the collaboration.
- Establish a shared agenda and work plan for the collaboration.



Offered to an active collaboration experiencing conflict. Includes relevant components of Launchpad Support. Sample objectives include:

- Facilitate a solution to a specific problem using a mediated approach.
- Address the deficiencies that may have led to the problem, increasing future capacity to work productively.
